One Address, Lasting Impact

The Community Impact Network

1623 Kienlen Avenue.

At first glance, it is just an address. But for generations, this building has been a place where young lives were shaped and futures were imagined. Today, it is home to the Community Impact Network. Years ago, it housed the Wellston Early Childhood Center. While the institutions differ, they share a common purpose: investing in the future of youth across the 24:1 community.

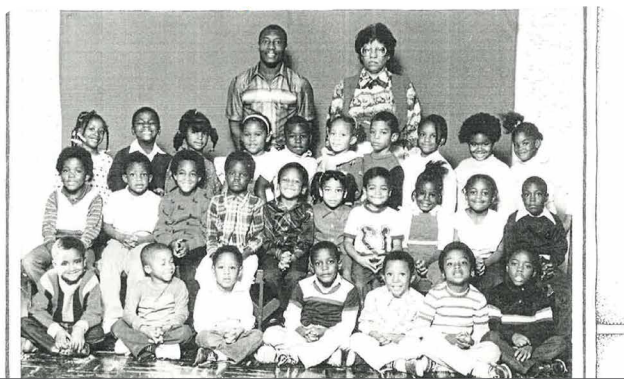
A Building of the Past

Once filled with the laughter and energy of eager students, the Wellston Early Childhood Center welcomed young learners from Wellston and Hillsdale as they began their educational journeys.

Carl Davis, a long-time resident of Wellston, began his educational career as a physical education teacher at Wellston Early Childhood Center. “I love this building,” Davis said. “My family was one of two Black families that lived in Wellston when we moved here, and this building is where I got my start in education, so for me it feels like home.”

Like Davis’ family, many Black families began relocating to North St. Louis County suburbs during the 1950’s and 1960’s, as part of the “Urban Renewal”¹, a federal initiative to revitalize inner cities with new housing and construction that displaced many long-time residents (and neighborhoods). While more black residents settled in communities like Wellston and Hillsdale, other residents began to leave and along with them, economic investment.

Wellston, once a thriving shopping destination known for the Wellston Loop and bustling local businesses, experienced significant economic decline over time. The Wellston School District felt the impact deeply. It lost accreditation in 2007 and was disbanded in 2010, later merging into the Normandy Schools Collaborative.

When the early childhood center closed, the building remained.

Its classrooms were quiet. Its future was uncertain. But the story of this building and this community was not finished.

A Building of the Present

As 1623 Kienlen Avenue stood empty, community members and leaders began asking a critical question:

How do we restore opportunity in a region that has experienced decades of systemic inequity?

From those ongoing conversations and collaborations led by Beyond Housing emerged the 24:1 community—a coalition of 24 municipalities in North St. Louis County united by a shared commitment to equity and restoring once thriving neighborhoods. Today, the 24:1 includes 22 municipalities, working collectively to strengthen opportunity and stability.

In 2017, the Community Impact Network was established to advance equitable access to opportunity in the 24:1. By 2020, 1623 Kienlen Avenue became its home—anchoring the Network’s work in the heart of the 24:1 and deepening its commitment to coordinated service delivery, strengthening organizations and investing in community-driven change.

The Network’s mission remains:

To build equity by serving the individuals and organizations who create opportunities for residents of the 24:1.

Through the Network’s impact areas—healthy babies/early childhood education, basic needs, the youth continuum and community investment—the Network strengthens the very ecosystem that supports children

and families. Partnerships with organizations like United 4 Children and The Legacy Center (TLC) ensure that educators, youth leaders and organizations have access to training, collaboration and shared support so that young people can thrive. The Network also serves as a convener and connector listening deeply to nonprofit partners and intentionally bringing those organizations together to align resources, share insight and co-create solutions to the complex challenges facing the community.

A Building of the Future

More than just a brick building with walls and rooms, 1623 Kienlen Avenue has always been a place where the future of our community is cultivated.

The Network responds to community needs in real time, working to remove barriers that stand between families and stability.

The same walls that once welcomed young learners now house a network committed to equity, opportunity and legacy.

And that work continues. ➤

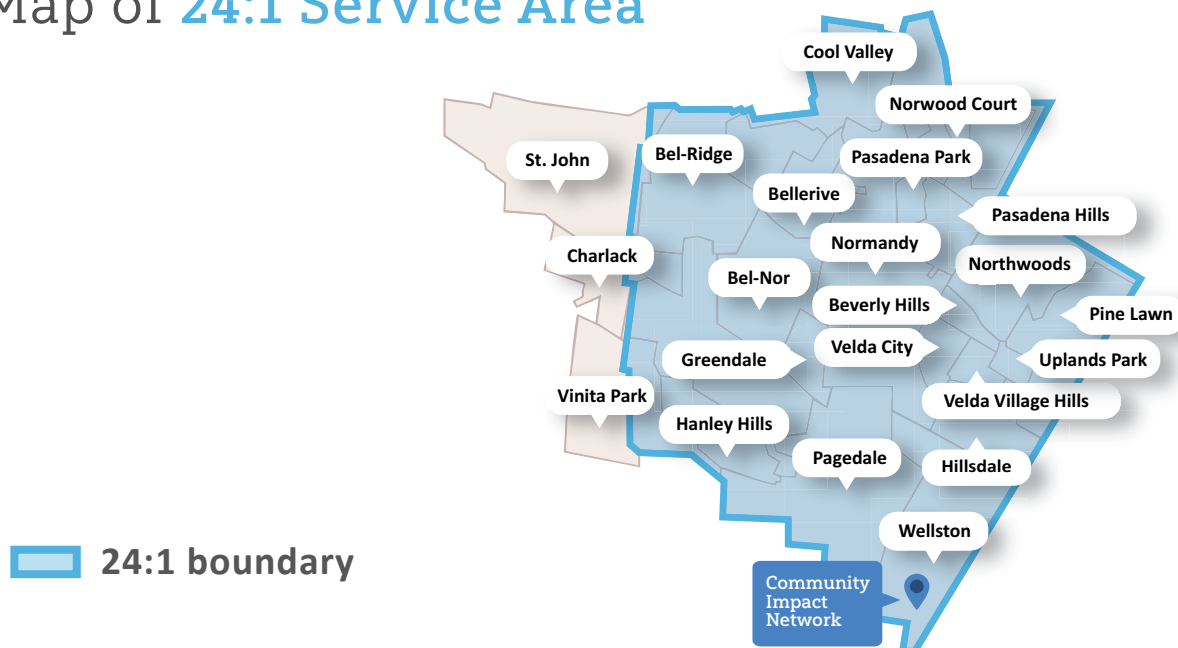

Map of **24:1 Service Area**

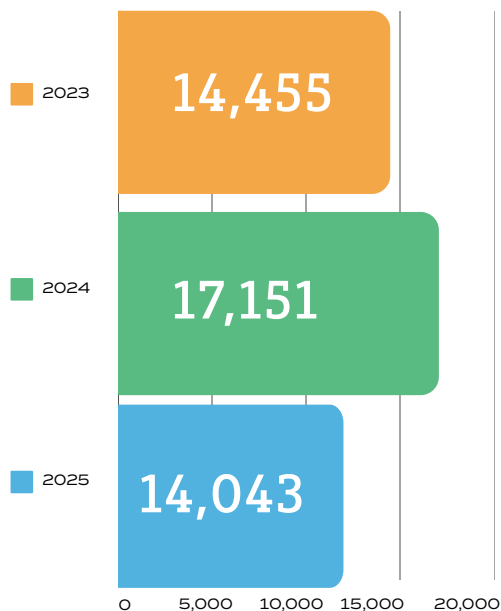

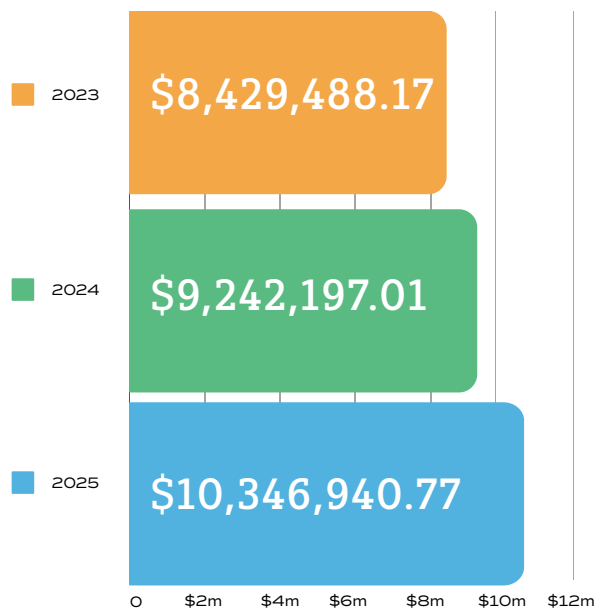
Impact through Expansion

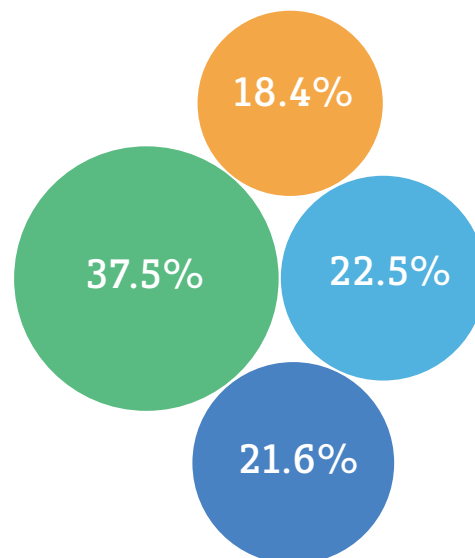

Programs Achieving Quality



Strengthening Early Childhood in the 24:1

The earliest years of a child's life shape everything that follows. Across the 24:1 community, early childhood providers work every day to give young learners a strong start.

The Programs Achieving Quality (PAQ) initiative is a collaborative effort that connects childcare providers with the training, resources and partnerships needed to support children and families.

Though PAQ took shape in 2010 the roots of this work go back more than a decade.

Building the Foundation

When the 24:1 initiative launched in 2008, Network partner, Beyond Housing, collaborated with community leaders and residents to better understand the challenges families were facing after years of economic and population decline. One priority quickly emerged: supporting children during their earliest years of development.

To address these needs, longtime partners, including United 4 Children, Nurses for Newborns and Parents as Teachers, joined Beyond Housing to coordinate services for families with young children. Created in 2010, their collaboration led to the creation of the 5byAge5 coalition, which focused on three priorities: healthy babies, early intervention and quality early learning.

Over a decade later, the Network continues to support the initiative by strengthening connections

among participating organizations and expanding support for early childhood providers.

A New Chapter for Early Learning

Building on the work of the 5byAge5 coalition, a new initiative emerged: PAQ. The updated model brought together longtime and new partners, including United 4 Children, Belle Children's Services of St. Louis Arc, Nurses for Newborns and The St. Louis Diaper Bank. Together, these organizations created a coordinated system of support for early childhood providers throughout the 24:1 community.

For Tina Mosely, distinguished PAQ alumnus and Executive Director of S.T.A.R. for Early Childhood Educators (STAR), the work is personal. Mosely first encountered the program years ago as a participating childcare provider. Through PAQ's workshops and training opportunities, she and her staff earned their Child Development Associate certifications.

"I absolutely loved the concept of the program from the beginning," Mosely said. "I had never been involved in anything like it during my time in childcare."

When STAR was invited to become one of the initiative's leading partners in 2024, Mosely and her co-founder, Adrienne Pennington, also a PAQ alumnus, quickly accepted.

"The PAQ initiative has grown by keeping

experienced providers involved while welcoming new ones into the work,” Mosely said.

In 2025, the initiative evolved into PAQ 3.0, a more structured model that connects organizations and providers through a coordinated cycle of support.

When Partnership Matters Most

The strength of the Network is most visible in moments of crisis. In May 2025, after a tornado destroyed Ms. Sherrie’s home, also the site of her childcare business, partners quickly mobilized to respond.

Through swift coordinated action, the Network and PAQ 3.0 partners connected Ms. Sherrie, a longtime PAQ member, to a newly renovated home, ensuring she could rebuild and continue serving families in the community.

Looking Forward

As PAQ continues to evolve, the initiative is more coordinated, aligned and impactful—bringing early childhood providers together around a shared vision of quality care.

“My hope for PAQ 3.0 is that it continues to elevate early childhood education as a foundational part of Missouri’s educational system,” said Rashaan Bush, Senior Manager of Community Partnerships at Community Impact Network. “Children’s learning begins at birth, and families depend on consistent, high-quality childcare to work and thrive.” ➤

The Legacy Center

A Building Shaped by Generations

When The Legacy Center (TLC) opened in 2023, Dr. Terry Harris, Founder and CEO, wanted to create a place where young people in the 24:1 community could explore their interests, develop new skills and imagine new possibilities for their futures.

Long before it became home to TLC, however, at 6800 Normandale Avenue had already spent decades serving young people in Normandy.

Built in 1937, the building originally housed McKinley Elementary School, where generations of students attended kindergarten through fifth grade. For decades, children filled its hallways each day, learning lessons meant to guide them well beyond the classroom.

As the city's population declined, enrollment fell and the school eventually closed in 2014. Still, many in the community believed the building's story was far from over.

In 2020, through a partnership with the Network, the space reopened as the Harris-Stowe Community Impact Center, offering educational and professional development opportunities. Renovations transformed the classrooms into multipurpose rooms, a computer lab and office space designed to serve the surrounding community.

The Harris Stowe State University partnership concluded in 2022, but the building's purpose remained the same: supporting young people and investing in the next generation.

A New Vision for a Familiar Space

When TLC moved into the building in 2023, Dr. Harris saw an opportunity to create something different from the traditional classroom environment many students had experienced.

"We wanted young people and families to walk into this building and not feel the weight or baggage that sometimes comes with traditional school environments," Dr. Harris said. "Instead, we wanted it to feel like a space that simply belongs to young people; a place of freedom, creativity, joy and possibility."

Today, TLC offers a range of programs for youth across the 24:1 community. Through its no-cost after-school program, students from third through twelfth grade can participate in activities ranging from coding and robotics to visual and performing arts' including programs such as graphic design and photography.

For many students, TLC's programs become more than just activities; they become a starting point for new ideas and ambitions. A shining example of this can be seen through The Blade Runners, a youth-led lawn care and landscaping business founded by four TLC students.

The group launched their business through TLC's Youth Enterprises, LLC, an entrepreneurial workshop designed to help students turn ideas into real ventures. What began as a classroom concept soon became a working business, with the students'

managing services, building clients and learning firsthand what it takes to run a company.

In addition to its work with students, TLC's partners have worked alongside more than 20 Network partners to support young people across the community.

"Through our partnership with Community Impact Network, The Legacy Center has been able to grow tremendously over the past three years," Dr. Harris said. "We've been able to strengthen our programs, reach more students and deepen the services we provide."

A Building of Possibility

As TLC looks ahead, its leaders continue to think about what new opportunities they can build for students in the years to come.

For Dr. Harris, the guiding philosophy behind this work is what he calls "freedom dreaming": the belief that meaningful change begins when people allow themselves to imagine possibilities beyond current limitations.

"If we continue to freedom dream alongside partners like the Community Impact Network, then I believe we will keep creating new possibilities for young people across the 24:1 community," Dr. Harris said.

Nearly a century after it first opened its doors, 6800 Normandale Avenue continues to welcome new generations of young people, having become a place where creativity, curiosity and ambition take root.

And with every student who walks through the building doors, the next chapter of its story begins. ➤

MARVL Initiative

Transforming Vacant Lots into Homeownership Opportunities

In 2025, the Network officially launched the MARVL (Making Assets by Revitalizing Vacant Lots) Initiative as a new service to municipalities within the 24:1. Through MARVL, the Network, in partnership with Beyond Housing Capital Fund, converts municipally owned vacant parcels into buildable lots.

The MARVL Initiative originated from discussions with local municipal leaders, who identified both a challenge with vacant properties and a need for new homeownership opportunities. The initiative addresses these needs simultaneously by turning underutilized parcels into new housing that meets contemporary families' needs.

MARVL Benefits

- Municipalities gain new residents

- The appeal of living in the 24:1 community when high-quality housing is available

First Year Results

During its first year, MARVL was piloted in the City of Pagedale with strong results. Six homes were sold by McBride Homes and several additional developments are planned.

By transforming vacant lots into new homeownership opportunities, MARVL strengthens housing stability, supports pathways to build generational wealth and advances long-term community revitalization across the 24:1. ➤

In Service to the 24:1

In 2025, the Network continued to build connections that empowered organizations. From equipping service providers with critical resources to honoring their tireless work and mobilizing support during moments of regional need, 2025 demonstrated how collective action can create meaningful impact across generations.

Network Meetings and Trainings

Throughout the year, the Network convened partners through meetings, trainings and community events designed to strengthen service delivery and expand access to resources across the 24:1 community. From the inaugural Community Network Picnic to focused sessions on health access and advocacy, these gatherings equipped organizations with the knowledge and tools to better support families.

Beyond The Backpack

In August, the Network joined community partners for the annual Beyond the Backpack event, providing a one-stop resource hub for NSC families. More than 2,000 students received backpacks, school supplies and essential services—along with 830 pairs of new sneakers through Sneakers With Soul—helping them start the school year prepared, confident and ready to succeed.



Wellness in the Field

In September, the Network hosted its third annual Wellness in the Field event in partnership with the Innovative Technology Education Fund, honoring direct service providers with an evening focused on rest and renewal. Through wellness services and shared experiences, the event reinforced the importance of caring for those who care for others, ensuring they have the support and energy needed to continue serving the community.

Tornado Relief Efforts

In May 2025, following a devastating tornado in North St. Louis, the Network joined regional partners to support families facing immediate need. Through coordinated efforts with Urban Sprouts, St. Louis Diaper Bank, STAR Coaching, Prodigal House Ministry and The Gateway Early Childhood Alliance, the Network supported emergency funding, relief hubs and helped distribute essential supplies—including food, hygiene items and basic necessities—to impacted communities.

Supporting Food Distribution During Crisis

In November 2025, uncertainty surrounding Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits prompted swift action to support families across the 24:1 community. In partnership with the St. Augustine Wellston Center, Beyond Housing, The Legacy Center and early childcare centers in the PAQ 3.0 initiative, the Network helped distribute more than 1,000 food boxes providing essential food items to families when they needed it most.

While the immediate crisis was resolved, this effort reinforced the importance of reliable food access and demonstrated how coordinated partnerships can meet urgent needs and strengthen long-term community stability.

A Night With the Stars

In December, the Network welcomed more than 250 community members and partners to its Fourth Annual A Night with the Stars celebration, honoring the direct service providers who strengthen the 24:1 community each day. A record 71 individuals were nominated, with 17 recipients recognized for their leadership and impact.

Centered around the theme “Celebrating Generational Growth”, the evening was hosted by Emmy-award winning KMOV news anchor, Damon Arnold, and featured keynote remarks by Miranda Walker-Jones, CEO of the Little Bit Foundation. Collectively, the event highlighted the work of those who create opportunities for families and communities—both for today and for generations to come.

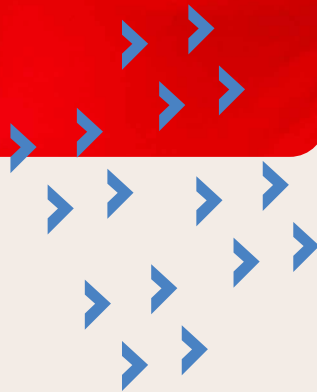
